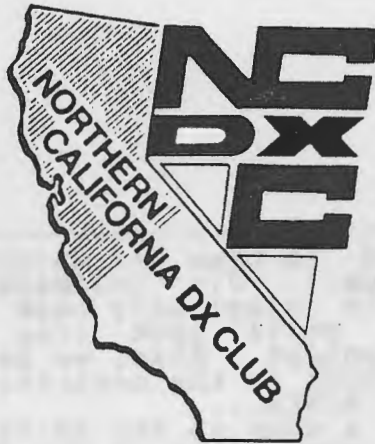

In their note from Africa, dated 3 Feb 1986, Lloyd & Iris, W6KG & W6QL said they had "...made 6500 QSO's with radio amateurs in 135 countries... on 10,15,20,40 and 80 meters." They're currently in Zimbabwe and after that are hoping for either Zambia or Malawi.

THE DISASTER EXPEDITION TO VK9 LORD HOWE ISLAND OF DJ5CQ as told by SWL Hans of Lord Howe Island

DM Rudi since September 1985, on his second expedition to Lord Howe Island has met with unbelievable disasters. Rudi, staying with a German friend on LHI had as his main objective, to give this rare country to as many DX'ers as possible. With the presently poor conditions, he has, to date, managed to make in excess of 12,000 contacts on all bands - both CW and Phone. His real challenge was to work the rare 80 meter band.

Rudi, VK9NM/LH installed a 2 element (tri-band) beam for 10-15-20 meter bands, a vertical for 40 meters and started to warm up. After about two weeks, Rudi was eager to install his 80 meter delta loop. He climbed a 20 meter pine tree to install it, only to find it on the ground the next morning; it having been brought down by a severe storm. He is now on his 5th 80 meter antenna after repairing and trying a dipole and an inverted vee again and again.

But little did Rudi know what life had in store for him. Sometime around November 6, 1985 Rudi complained of not feeling well. Being 20,000 km away from home and family he did not want to see a doctor. On November 9th, SWL Hans had to drag Rudi off to see Dr. Ken Hicks, the local doctor who also happens to be VK9LK. Dr. Hicks diagnosed a serious illness which required emergency treatment.

The Royal Australian Air Force medical team with complete operating theatre and four doctors and staff, came at 1:00 am in the morning of November 10th, in a four engine Hercules aircraft 700 km from Sydney to land on a 900 meter runway lit up by kerosine lamps, in 40 km crosswinds and very heavy rain. Conditions were so bad that the pilot only saw the runway 30 seconds before touchdown. His approach was only done through navigation, as the LHI airport doesn't have instrument approach facilities. Within an hour of their arrival, this great RAAF medical team had set up a complete operating theatre in the 3 bed hospital and satisfactorily performed a life saving operation on Rudi. Mid morning on November 10th, he was taken to a hospital near Sydney by the RAAF team.

VK9NM/LH was nearly 4 weeks recuperating in Sydney, the first 11 days in hospital and the balance staying with Manfred, VK2BZW, who went beyond the call of duty in assisting and supporting Rudi during his lonely stay in Sydney. Manfred visited Rudi daily in the hospital.

And it's true that you can't keep a true DX'er down, because Rudi was being heard on the band by myself on LHI - working from Manfred's mobile station in the parking lot of his hospital.

Rudi returned to Lord Howe Island on December 5 with a new spirit and a new LHI call, VK9LM, to resume his DX expedition after, once again, repairing his 80 meter antenna.

With only 80 watts on his old Kenwood TS820, VK9LM only managed to contact occasionally JA or W stations; could hear Europe, but only managed to contact 5 Finns (OH), 1 Italian (I1APQ), 3 Swedes (SM6 & SM7), 1 Austrian (OE6MB6) and 1 Yugoslavian (YU2DE).

Rudi received word from Germany that his mother had been admitted on January 6, 1986 to a German hospital with an unknown - possibly serious illness. Rudi's XYL, after delivering his mother to the hospital, had a minor accident through the ice on her way home.

But the "crowning" blow was yet to come. Early in the morning of January 8th, Rudi received an urgent phone call from Manfred, VK2BZW in Sydney, who acted as his relay station. Manfred had to tell Rudi from his family, that unfortunately, in the night of 6/7 January 1986, his house, which included his home base DJ5CQ radio shack, together with his Drake line, computer & accessories, plus a collection of QSL cards going back to 1958, had burned to the ground and was completely destroyed.

This bungalow was just completed, being built when Rudi received the invitation from Hans at Lord Howe Island for the expedition. In the great excitement of a return trip to the South Pacific, Rudy, sadly, forgot to insure the recently finished building.

Rudi regularly helped and supported young amateurs and allowed his station to be used when it was not in use by himself. The irony of this very sad saga is that Rudi, VK9LM after giving nearly 30,000 stations their LHI during his two expeditions to the island, was to hear his own station in Germany, for the first time on Lord Howe Island. It was operated by a young German ham with Rudi's permission through his XYL. Rudi was so proud and happy that he called me into his

temporary expedition shack at Lord Howe Island so that I could hear how beautiful his Drake line came through on the 20 meter band. He had a very long QSO with his own station.

Rudi did not know that this would be the last time he would hear his station from Germany.

Twelve hours later his life work, his amateur radio and his dream for retirement were in ashes. Rudi has had word from Germany, that preliminary indications from police and fire investigators are that the fire started in the corner where his station was located.

VK9LM is at an end and knows that on his return to Germany, he is left with nothing. Rudi has financed all of his DXpeditions without any help from companies, DX clubs or individuals. Through these two LHI expeditions, VK9LM has given many thousands of DX'ers a point for their DXCC certificate. I believe that a hundred years in amateur radio history will pass before an amateur has so much misfortune served on him during a DXpedition.

Rudi hopes to remain on Lord Howe Island a little while longer. He requests that all further QSL confirmations should be directed to his home address;

Lord Howe Island is a small community of some 270 people. And, on hearing of Rudi's terrible misfortune, has rallied to his support. Some 250 dollars has been collected in this small community.

Being myself only an SWL at present, but hoping to be ham myself one day, I now wish to appeal to all DX Amateurs, world wide, to rally to Rudi, VK9LM's support, so that he can rebuild from the ashes. It would be nice, if amateur magazines and DX clubs, world wide, could publicize this story.

I am confident that Rudi's shattered belief in life will be restored; and it will make all of you in DX'ing very happy when you will hear a grateful DJ5CQ once again on the band and that you were able to help another amateur in great need. Any support should be directed to his home address.

AA6G, Chuck sent us the following note;

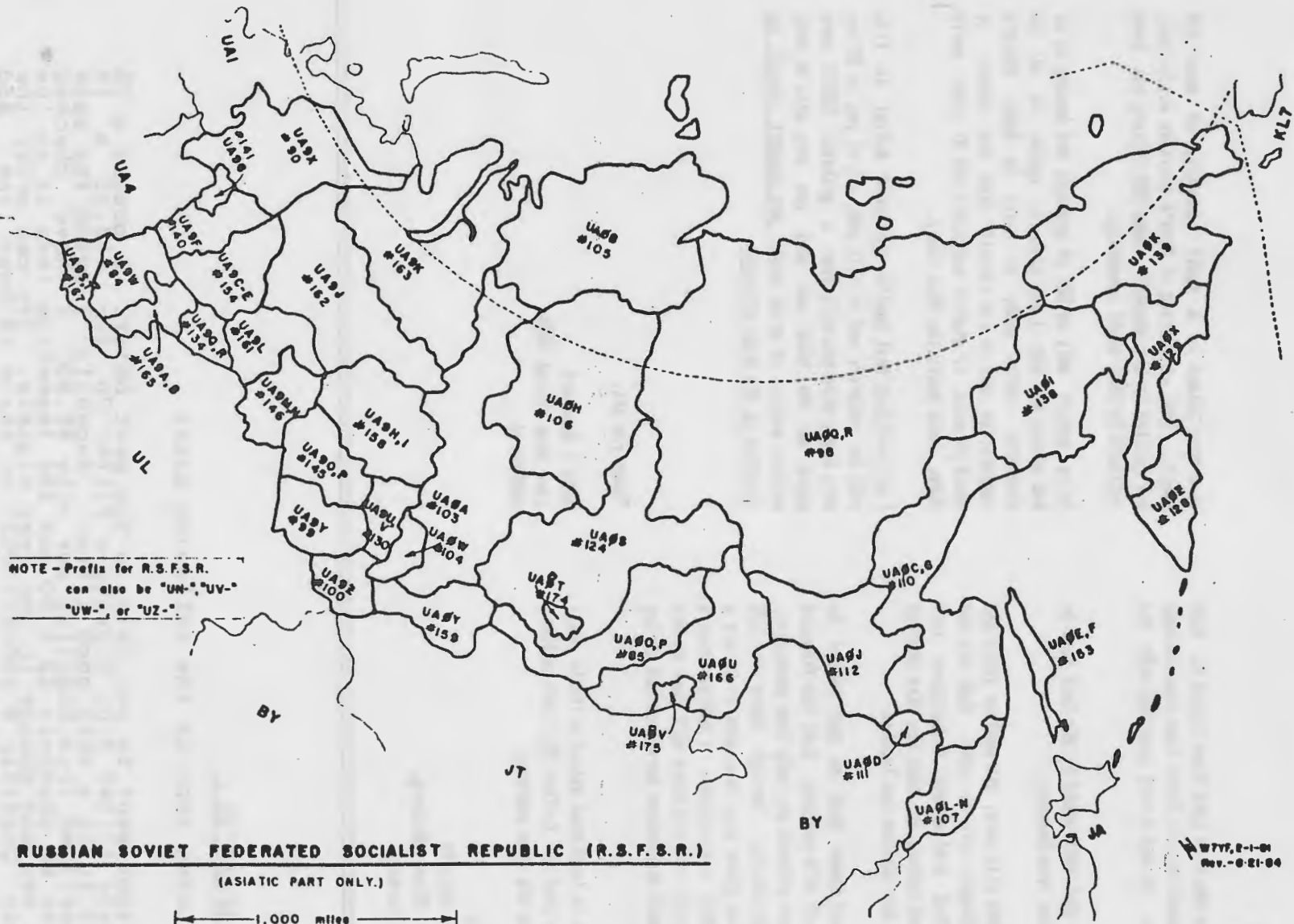
George,

You might want to put this in the next DX'er. I bought a 75 ohm high pass filter from Microwave Filter Co for \$12.00 & it turned out to be a very good filter. Recently, I found the same filter advertised from Unadilla for only \$5.80! I have checked this filter on channels 22 & 50 and the insertion loss is so low I couldn't see any change in the weak signals. You can order the filter from Unadilla @ 800-523-0027 on their 24 hour line. Add 5% (\$2.00 min.) for shipping.

The filter is extra nice, because it has a male "F" conn. on one end and a female "F" conn. on the other - no patch cable needed.

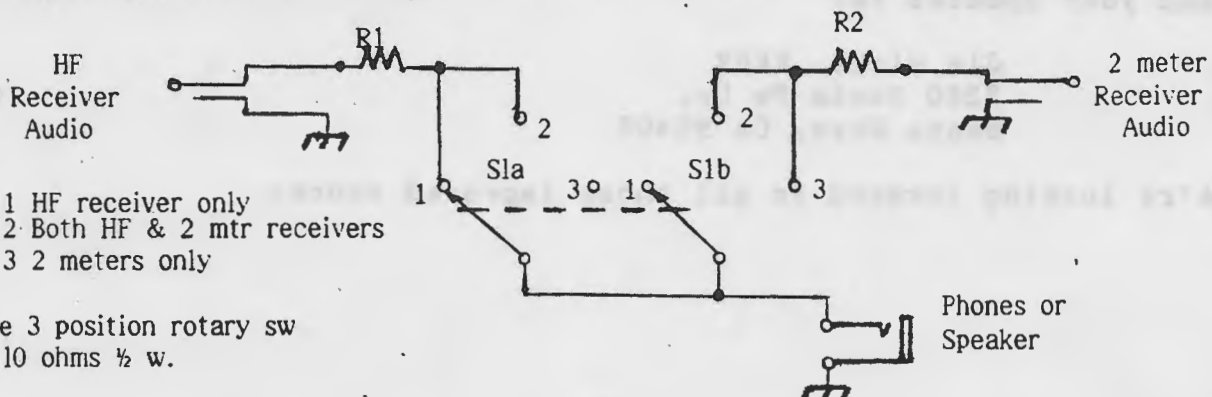

HF2 METER SWITCH BOX

Does listening to 2 meters and 20 meters at the same time cause you problems? Do your HF headphones mask that DX announcement on 2 meters. Does that 2 meter rag chewing pest annoy you to distraction? Maybe a simple one knob switching arrangement is a panacea for your problems. The following circuit, built in a mini-box, allows listening to your HF receiver only, or your 2 meter receiver only, or both HF and 2 meter receivers simultaneously:



Position 1 HF receiver only
Position 2 Both HF & 2 mtr receivers
Position 3 2 meters only

S1 2 pole 3 position rotary sw
R1, R2 10 ohms ½ w.
