

Minutes NCDXC General Meeting May 12, 1995

The meeting, held at the Dunfey Hotel in San Mateo was called to order at 20:09 by President Knochenhauer, K6ITL.

The president again appealed to the assembled group for another DXer editor. The past several months issues have been put together by a small group consisting of K6ITL, N6AN and W6VG.

He also announced that WX6M who has been the club contest chairman for some time has found it necessary to ask to be relieved of this responsibility. Rich has done a good job for a long time for which he deserves our gratitude. This is not an onerous job and may be a good way to get involved in club activities. Volunteers are solicited.

The annual NCDXC Marathon starts on June first. While many participate, there are few who submit scores. Obviously the participation is the major concept, especially this year when we are trying to promote more activity in our California Award. It was suggestd athat we get on and also mention that we are NCDXC members. This award has a good reputation with DXers throughout the world but it should be remembered that the applicants must work 220 california stations of which at least 20 must be NCDXC members.

Membership was voted for Bob Zavrel, W7SX, Phil Nunuz, AC6HY, and Ken Millman, K1ZKM.

Val Quinn, WN6R, and Ed Anselmo, KW6N, were reinstated as club members.

Tom Jones, K6TS, presented a well formed plan for promoting DX among younger groups of hams which he appropriately dubbed "DX Ambassadors". His work is tied into the ARRL and also some local interested DXers and though he suggested it is the incipient stages, it is the result of much reflective thought. His comment that "DX to create friendship throughout the world" has great merit.

Jack Troster, W6ISQ, reported on DX Advisory Committee matters. He informed that a request to reconsider the status of Pratus Island as a new DX country has been requested. In another matter, he reported that the minimum size concept which was approved by the Awaards Committee for country status takes effect on 20 April. The recent operation from Scarborough Reef precedes that date so status would not be affected by that change.

CLUB FINANCES

Many comments have been made and questions asked about the club finances and an explanation seems due.

Three accounts are maintained by the NCDXC, Inc.

- 1. A Life Membership Certificate of Deposit contains all the payments for Life Memberships. Each year the full dues (\$24) for each member is withdrawn from this account. If the actuarial table is correct the account should last as long as the Life members. It may be used for no other purposes.
- 2. A regular checking account is maintained and all dues and other general receipts are deposited in, and all obligations are paid from, this account.
- 3. An interest paying savings account serves as a reserve account into which all non-operating funds are deposited. Included in this account, are three separate set-aside funds to be used for specific purposes, namely; the "seed money" for the DX convention (\$3,500), the QSL card fund for purchasing blank stock (3,100), and the repeater fund (\$750). The latter was a result of the dues increase in 1986 in which \$2.50 was "tapped" for each full member. Any unused balance for this is available for general operations. An operating repeater account is maintained by the Repeater Committee Chairman and replenished from the above account as needed.

During the past several years, the cost of everything has increased tremendously and the club's expenditures have far exceeded the receipts from dues. The deficits have been covered each year by the returns from the convention, however, we can't count on this happening every two years. The reserve funds may well be tapped for this soon.

The proposed budget for this year was printed in the November 1994 DXer and showed a \$4,144 deficit over anticipated receipts Additional sources of revenue may have to be explored.

*****THE GRAYING OF THE NCDXC CONTESTER ******

The May issue of the DXer contained a questionnaire designed to be answered easily and without great complication in terms of tabulating. It was anticipated that, like the issue of "Charlie" several months ago, there would be a great outpouring of response!

Suffice it to say, that was not the case. When the returns are less than expected, a statistician will provide pie charts, bar graphs and report the results in percentages. To give you an idea of how this works, the table below gives the results in terms of the percentages for each of the four options.

1. Keep the present competition between the two DX clubs;	17.6%
2. Keep the present competition and add a new trophy for the combined scores of the DX and Contest clubs;	35.3%
3. Start a new competition as proposed by the NCCC with members giving scores to the club of their choice;	29.4%
4. Forget the contest, retire the trophy and let everyone do their own thing:	17.6%

The total is less than 100% (actually 99.894117) due to rounding off.

Before jumping to any conclusions, a search through the DXer was made for the past few years to see if a trend could be identified. In 1989, the NCDXC reported a total of 28,910,135 points! In 1991, the total had dropped off by 22% to a total of 22,586,784. In 1992 there was an almost 50% reduction to 11,851,356; in 1993 a slight increase to 12,191,199, then a precipitous drop to 8,389,293 in 1994. Unofficial total for 1995 was given as 6,191,704. Whether these reductions are due to a lack of participation and interest by the NCDXC members or the lowered propagation levels is not easy to determine.

Pragmatic findings in addition to the many comments on W6TI/R, would indicate that many of the NCDXC members no longer have the will, desire, or stamina to go full bore in the contest.

Now to the real findings! The numerical responses are as follows:

- 1. 3
- 2. 6
- 3. 5
- 4. 3

Total

17!

One cannot help but feel that, for whatever reason(s), the NCDXC membership is not very active in the ARRL DX Contest. If there were strong feelings to continue the NCDXC/SCDXC inter-club contest, we should have received far more responses. One can only assume that there is little interest in the contest activity by our members. Unless there is a major and unexpected objection, it appears that the inter-club competition is now kaput. The final decision and notification to the NCCC and SCDXC will be up to the next NCDXC administration as it would be unfair to make a decision just two weeks prior to their election.

INTERNATIONAL DX CONVENTION IN VISALIA?

Immmediately after the convention, and for the next two weeks or so, a flurry of messages were passed on the DXPSN regarding the recent D. Convention in Visalia. Although the Convention Committee, co-chaired by WA6O and NG6X, did not receive many written comments directly, they were not unaware of those on the packet cluster. Some 30 operators generated over 35 messages and replies which spanned the universe from a great convention, I can hardly wait until next year, to, "I'll never go to Visalia gain." A quick review showed that most were not members of the NCDXC and, therefore, might represent a sampling of those who attended. Several, however, did not attend although they added some rather critical comments. In an effort to determine what the feelings were of the NCDXC members, a simple, though as it turns out inadequate, questionnaire was inserted in the May issue of the DXer. Due to the immediate deadline for publication, the survey instrument was not pre-tested and turned out not to offer quantifiable results. Despite this, all those that were returned, plus the packet messages, have been tallied and the results consolidated. Unfortunately, the sample is too small to truly represent all those who attended and participated, however they are worthy of note and the next planning committee for the 1997 convention should consider the comments in making arrangements.

Although written comments were not solicited, almost every questionnaire had one or more comments or suggestions, some simple and others more complex. A total of 25! questionnaires was returned. Of those, 11 or 44% emphatically stated "don't move from Visalia"; 3, or 12% made no recommendation; 2, or 8% said "Any place but Visalia"; and 8, or 32% urged that some other location be considered. Interestingly, one member, well known as an outstanding dxpeditioner and contester said "Visalia's great. Keep it there." Several others rationalized their choice of staying in Visalia by pointing out that it is equally convenient, or inconvenient, for all, and that the food and service quality could be "fixed". Others mentioned the U.S. Towers barbecue and tour to be a good reason to stay. On the other hand, 8 respondents offered several alternatives in location and felt that nothing could make Visalia a good location for the convention. Of the suggestions for other locations, alternating between SF area and LA seemed to be the most popular garnering 8 votes. Other locations suggested were: Reno, 5; Fresno, 1; Bakersfield, 1; Anaheim, 3; Las Vegas, 3; San Jose, 2; Santa Rosa, 1; San Diego 1, and San Luis Obispo, 3. On the other hand, 9 respondents voted "No" on Reno or Las Vegas. The totals exceed the number of returns since many suggested more than one location.

Most respondents, 14, said that RV parking was not an issue, while 5 said it was, and 6 made no comment. The median dollar cost was \$125 with 7 indicating that \$200 or more was acceptable and 5 indicating \$75 or less. Since the increased cost factor was not identified it is impossible to determine what true increase, if any, is acceptable. Since the overall return was so small, the only value that can be received from this attempt is 'identify the undercurrent of unhappiness of some of those who attended and, hopefully, the next planning committee can take these into consideration for 1997.

In terms of time, 6 indicated 4 hours; 2 indicated 6 hours; 3 said 8 hours; 2 checked 8+ hours and 3 said 2 hours maximum flying time. The major complaints seemed to center around the lack of air service, the quality of the food and service, the difficulty of getting rooms at the convention hotel and, two respondents asked for improvements in the program offerings. These complaints were similar to those on the packet system, in that most centered around the banquet and breakfast food quality and level of service, difficulty of getting to Visalia by commercial transportation, and the problem of getting room reservations at the Holiday Inn. Several (4) said, "there is nothing else to do in Visalia" and suggested Reno, Las Vegas, Anaheim or " almost any other place would be more fun"

So what was accomplished by this exercise? First, it appears that the vast majority of club members did not wish to take the time or make the effort to respond, thereby giving only a small sample. Including those on packet, there was only a total of 52 different operators who offered comments and suggestions, good, bad, or indifferent. Even if all had attended, and many did not, this represents only 8% of the registrants. Second, it did provide much food for thought for those planning future conventions. Since there is a definite feeling by some that another location would be a better place to hold the convention, it would make sense to form a study group to investigate as many locations and facilities as possible for comparison with the Holiday Inn at Visalia, taking into account the accessibility, the services and facilities available at each location and the total cost for the meeting rooms, banquet and breakfast, exhibit and demonstration areas, and other facilities and services. The study group could obtain proposals from various locations and develop one or more proposals that might be feasible. These could then be submitted to both the Northern and Southern California DX Clubs for review and any action. Since each club serves as the host in alternate years, no decision should be taken unilaterally without the explicit agreement of the other. Such a proposal should also indicate what, if any, changes would result in terms of anticipated attendance and sponsorship by the exhibitors.

One member cited a number of reasons for staying in Visalia assuming that the hotel can improve its services. First, he points out that the solar cycle is nearing its low and there probably will be limited HF DX activity, that the number of registrants has remained at a fairly constant level of about 650; that the number of new DXCC applications has dropped and that we may have maxed out already. In addition, he points out that Dayto is Dayton and Visalia is DX! Moving to Reno or Las Vegas would change the DX Convention to "some mushy something else."



THE CONTINUING SAGA OF ANOTHER HORIZON

We were very pleased to receive a long letter from our voyaging club member, Steve Salmon, AA6LF/3D2LF, who is on an extended voyage around the world on his yacht Another Horizon. His letter is reprinted below and I think you will find it as interesting as I did. (The mail service from Fiji is phenomenal as his letter arrived here on May 15!)

May 10, 1995

Suva, Fiji

Dear Knock:

I thought you might like to have this for the DXer. A couple of words of explanation may be in order. Tom Luten, the author, was aboard our yacht Another Horizon with my wife, N6WHJ, and myself when we stopped at Minerva Reef early last November. We set up a station for me to work DX from the reef. Except for a handful of dubious Don Miller contacts, it was a new one for IOTA, so the pileups were pretty large. The tide would only allow me to operate a few hours each day, which didn't often coincide with the hours when we had propagation, but I made almost 700 contacts in 41 countries over a period of about 10 hours. After the operation, we continued on to New Zealand, and Tom flew back to the states. Later, he gave us this poem as a gift.

I'm continuing with my plan to DX from rare or semi-rare spots as we make our way around the world, and enjoying it immensely. I've operated from the Marquesas, the Tuamotus, and the Haapi Group of Tonga, among others. Fellow NCDXC member Bob Fabry, N6EK, sometimes flies in to help me with an operation. The two of us activated a "new one" for IOTA off the coast of Mexico late in 1993, and Bob and his wife are joining us again for a couple of weeks in June; we plan to operate from the Yasawa Group in Fiji, which is fairly rae for IOTA. I'll be 3D2LF (in fact, I am now) and Bob will be 3D2EK.






