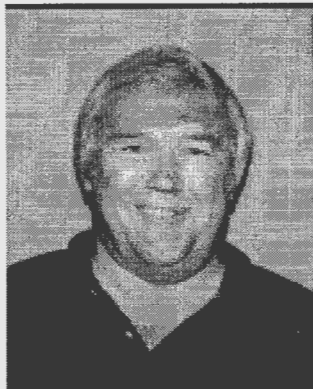

Mongolia on 160 Meters! by Garry Shapiro, NI6T

Many NCDXCers know that I have been an enthusiastic lowbander for several years—first on 80, and more recently on 160 meters. Those who have operated topband know that the band is quirky, erratic and given to long periods of noisy non-productivity, occasionally broken by DX opportunities. Some of these, as a counterpoint to the normal, excruciatingly boring stretches of nothing—especially on the west coast—are incredible, and the glow of these rare supernovas keeps the dedicated topbander glued to his radio. I have been the beneficiary of more than a few of these memorable opportunities, the most recent provided by an intrepid group of Mongolian DXers. In mid-January, these ops decided to activate the remote JT2 region—itsself rarely heard. In midwinter, they set out on bad roads for a town 650 km away, where they set up shop! When JU2DX was posted on 40 CW, I saw a possible topband opportunity. Mongolia and zone 23 are, after all, virtually unknown on 160 meters—W4ZV told me the last JT operation on topband was 15 to 20 years ago! There have been, in fact, only about 30 160 meter WAZ awards issued worldwide, 21 in Europe, and only 4 in North America. For North American topbanders, therefore, QSOs with zone 23, comprising only Mongolia, far western China and Tuva in Russia, have been nonexistent. Topbanders are used to asking DX stations on higher bands if they are QRV 160, only to be told that there is no antenna, or condx are impossible. The JU2DX op, in contrast, responded with “sked?” Since there had been good condx to JA, that got my adrenalin flowing a bit. It was already past sunrise here, after fruitless hours of listening for XW30, and I was able to persuade the operator, whose English was minimal, to QSY ato 1835 right then. Once there, I expected to hear nothing, so, when I heard a tuner quite clearly, I presumed it was a stateside eavesdropper from 40, hoping to score. The tuner, to my amazement, then proceeded to call me, signing JU2DX! Naturally, I called and sent a report. But it was not to be that easy. He called again, several times, and it became achingly clear that he did not hear me. Soon, he disappeared and went back to 40. A mail reader, apparently without prop, sent “BS.” On 40, the Mongolian op confirmed that he had not heard me, but acknowledged my info that I had heard him clearly. He agreed to try again the following day. The next morning, after more fruitless hours of listening for XW30, there was not a trace of a signal from JU2DX, nor did he show up on 40. This was not good news, but there was nothing to do but to come back the following morning, which I did, after another fruitless vigil for XW30. This time, JU2DX was QRV on 40 at 1500, before sunrise, but I could not seem to communicate well with him. When I broke his small pile, he agreed to move—but continued to work stations. I broke the pile again, at which point he sent “QSO B4.” Was this a different operator, who did not know what I was talking about? I broke the pile a third time, risking the wrath of those in the pile. If I let this go by, I thought, I will hate myself! This time I was able to communicate the urgency of moving NOW! I quickly moved to 1835 and signed a few times. Wow! There he was—stunningly loud and clear—and my heart leaped against my ribs. The QSO was quick and almost anticlimactic. I asked him repeatedly to stay on 160 for others, posted him on packet, and grabbed the telephone. Danny, K6UT, about to throw the switch and go to work, instead quickly QSYed and nailed him; Danny could not have been more surprised. Within seconds, JU2DX had a pileup of frenzied west coast topbanders, and logged a bunch of them before QSYing to 40.

He returned the following morning and logged a bunch more leftcoasters. But for some, it was even better than that. BY1QH, operated by K9FD and W0RI, had come up and a number of delirious topbanders had logged BOTH, back-to-back.

And, as it turned out, that was the end of that—the JU2DX expedition was over, and the ops on the way back to Ulan Baataar. Eventually, there was an email message to me, from JT1CD:

Dear Mr.Garri,

Just Sunday morning we come in Ulaanbaatar. Our team went from Ulaanbaatar to Choibalsan and return on a car. On the road we lost 3 days, because from Ulaanbaatar to Choibalsan about 650 km. Weather was about 25-30 degrees minus. We use R7 antenna and Inv.V for 160 m.

Our equipments were:

FT7575GX+FL2100Z and
FT900SD+AL811.

When I worked 40 meters, you several times want QSY to 160 meters and I was no sure. After was QSY on 1835 KHz your signal was really listen and it was great surprize. I think maybe our QSO first JT-USA on 160 m. Next days we worked with many European stations and VK, ZL, JA.Ou. DXpedition finished Friday afternoon in local time. Unfortunately, from Choibalsan to Ulaanbaatar broken all tubes of our AL811 Linear.

JT1AS, JT1BJ, JT1BL, JT1CJ and JT1CM. We had 5707 QSOs. It is not too enough! hi, hi QSLs for the JU2DX will support from YAESU MUSEN in JAPAN and I hope will receive soon. See you again and good DXing!

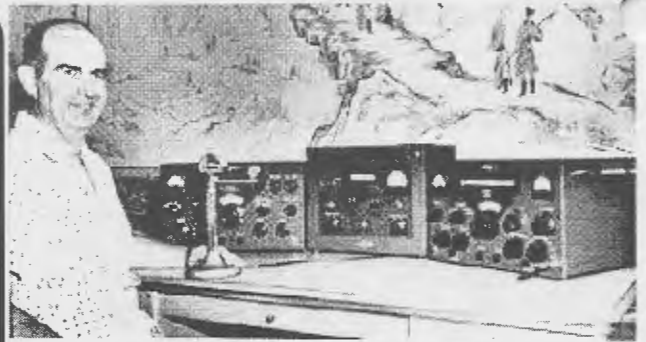
New Orleans Int'l DX Convention
