President's Comments





There are several services that could provide you with a history of your call sign for a fee. I tried to research my call signs of WB6WKM and W6KM. I tracked down the original owner of WB6WKM and found him to have been in Burbank, California but no matter how hard I tried I could not extract an original QSL card from him. I was much luckier when I got the call sign of W6KM. I have been able to get two original QSL cards from the family of Bill McAulay. For all I knew Bill was the original owner of the call. But, a few months ago my Buddy Tom, N9BUL in Beloit, Wisconsin, with whom I have kept a weekly sked for over 15 years, told me his brother, Conrad, W9DL (neat call) picked up an original 1930 list of US ham call signs. In those days the U.S. Department of Commerce Radio Division, kept the Ham call records and, of course, it was printed by the US Government Printing Office and it sold for 25 cents. I had Tom copy all of the 6th call area for me. In those days, the SIXTH DIS-TRICT headquarters was at the Customs House in San Francisco. The Sixth District comprised the States of California, Nevada, Utah, Arizona and the Territory of Hawaii.

Well, in 1930 I found W6KM was issued to Kenneth A. Adams in Stockton. Best I can tell, this call sign has never left Northern California. So with that in mind, I checked all of the calls of current members. I found **W6WB** to be listed to a Clayton Bane in San Francisco! A W6BIP to a Wilber Bachman, also in San Francisco. W6BSS was Joseph Hodgson in Pasadena, it now resides in Woodland with Bill Boots... W6BUY (Charter Member) was J. Holmes in Oakland. Jack now lives with his call in Reno... W6CBE, a Ronald Panton of San Leandro, moved to Menlo Park and has changed his call to W6VG... William Bates, Jr. of Los Angeles had the call, W6CF. Now, of course, it resides in Redwood Estates with **Jim Maxwell**... Archie Davis had **W6CSI** in Oakland. Now it is found in Redwood City with Norm Smaha... W6CU was Charles Filstead in Los Angeles it now belongs to Ed Hardin in San Lorenzo... W6CUA has moved up from Visalia. J.W. McElwee had it. Now, Randy Wright uses it in Castro Valley... Vince Chin picked up W6EE from Edward Ludes, who lived

in San Bruno. It didn't go very far, either... Frank W. Clark used W6EJ in Berkeley. Now, my old neighbor, (when I lived in Sacramento) Ed Anselmo is putting it on the air from Sacramento... W6EKR was used by Elmer Merril in Stockton. I wonder if he ran Mobile, like its new keeper, Walt Del Conte does over in Aromas... W6EMD once belonged to George Enos in Berkeley and now it has moved down to Dave Mechan in Redwood City... Everett Remers of Sacramento used W6ER, but now Don Sexton of Fairfield took it over... Tommy Farr of Denair is the new holder of W6IJ which once belonged to C. Kreighbaum of Los Angeles back then... Now here is a pretty good background linage of the W6JD call sign. I'm not sure it's complete, but it has a very historical background. In 1921 "6JD, V.M. Bitz made a very important Coast to Coast contact by 1930 Curtis Mason of Los Angeles had the call (see QST JANUARY 2000 AND THE EXCELLENT ARTICLE WRITTEN BY Jim Maxwell W6CF, titled AMATEUR RADIO 100 YEARS OF DISCOVERY, page 30). Our own Doug Westover, W6JD now keeps it active... Robert Flemming of Los Angeles had W6KH. It's now on the air with Dick Le Massena... Gordon Girton has W6NW. But it was Emery Stuedle's call in Los Angeles back then... W6NV was used by Karl Huppert in San Francisco. But it is now the call sign of Oliver Sweningsen in Orinda... I wonder how well known W6RJ was in those olden golden days? Today, it is a well known call, used by staunch club supporter, **Bob Ferrero**... Another call that did not go far away is W6RQ. Then it was C.F. Concannon in El Cerito. Now it is Al Lotze in San Francisco... W6TC was W.T. Rathbun up in Colusa. It is now kept active by George Badger in Portola Valley... Charter member, Elvin Feige of Oakland has the call, W6TT that Alden Besse used in San Francisco... Craig Smith now has W6WL as his new call. But it once belonged to Fred Wisener in San Diego... Alex Meyer of San Jose now has W6ZX. But Percy Dann of Berkeley had it then... I looked over the "K" calls which were then issued in Hawaii and found K6DB was Ormaond Wall. Now, of course, it belongs to Ken Anderson in Pine Grove, the husband of our newest full member Kay, K6KAY... Ray Rietow in Honolulu had K6ED. It now belongs to Ed Westbrook in Greenview. The last call, W6YD belongs to our Editor, George Allan, "Yankee Doodle". That call was used in 1930, by THE NATIONAL AUTOMOTIVE AND ELECTRICAL SCHOOL in Los Angeles.

I hope I haven't missed anyone in the club. I have had a lot of fun doing this article. Perhaps Jim Maxwell, W6CF may find some free time to help you find your call history if you're not on this list. It will be fun to see who has these calls in 2030. Chod Harris, VP2ML



It is with great sorrow that we must report the passing of Charles J. "Chod" Harris, WB2CHO/VP2ML, of Santa Rosa, who died December 8th of complications from a severe heart attack suffered in early November.

First licensed in the late 1960's, Chod ran the ARRL Club and Training Department in the mid-1970's. He helped to author the beginner's classic *Tune in the World with Ham Radio*, among other publications. He also wrote numerous articles for QST and other publications over the years and once published several DX bulletins. He took over as *CQ* DX Editor in July 1989.

An active contester and DXer, Chod had operated from several exotic locations. He obtained VP2ML while living on the island of Montserrat in the late 1970's and early 1980's before moving to California.

He also served as an IARU Region 2 Conference delegate from Montserrat, most recently in 1995 at Niagara Falls, Canada, where he chaired the HF Committee.

Survivors include his wife, Jean, whom he met while working at ARRL Head-quarters. A memorial service was held on December 10th in Santa Rosa. The family invited memorial donations to the American Heart Association or to the Northern California DX Foundation.

The Ham Radio Community mourns his loss.




Map to Redwood City Meeting Site

DXer Profile: AA6W, Don Anastasia




